Over the last few > summers we reached the stage of having huge "patties" of algae floating on > the lake and tons of it being thrown up onto our property and drying out The appearance and the odours were atrocious. > in the sun. > This in itself is worthy of concern, but the bigger picture of why this is > occuring should be of far greater concern. > I was interested to hear Dr. Harvey Shear and Mr. Murray Charlton speak > at the Sewage Treatment Proposed Expansion/Algae Forum on January 29 and > to learn about some of the testing that is being done. At least a start > has been made. > However, I am horrified to think that, in the light of the knowledge to > date, the Region is still prepared to increase the amount of phosphorous > that will inevitably end up in our water system as a result of the > expanded sewage plant. > The fact that this plan for expansion has progressed so quickly and with > so little opportunity for imput from the local residents is also > disturbing. It seems obvious that the increased level of odour, > traffic, noise and risk of traffic accident will impact significantly on > the local community. Conceivably this could result in health related
